Moving to Pittsfield in the early 1980's both Leslie and Harry have been involved community members – volunteering countless hours with many organizations and events.

Leslie has been active in the Library, serving on the Board of Trustees before becoming the Library Director; in the school as a School Board member, working on a grant focusing on the advisory model, working on the committee to evaluate the feasibility of outsourcing our high school students, and most recently was elected to the School District Treasurer in 2023. She has volunteered for many school district committees and is always working for the betterment of educating our students. She was the manager of the Pittsfield Senior Center for a number of years and in that capacity worked with many local groups including Pittsfield Youth Workshop. She has been a volunteer during town voting events for many years. When the Suncook Valley Sun closed, Leslie was instrumental in the development of the Pittsfield Post. She researched how to publish the newsletter, contacted volunteers to work on the newsletter and continues to be a vital member of the group that publishes The Post each week.

Harry is also a former School Board member. He has served on the Foss Scholarship Committee. He has been an active member of the Historical Society, a former Rotarian and currently volunteers with Granite State Ambassadors. Harry helps with the Pittsfield Post when needed. He has served on a number of town committees – including the Budget Committee, Housing Ordinance Committee, Website Committee and was a member of the Board of Trustee for Trust Funds.



Harry and Leslie are active members of the First Congregational Church and have held church officer positions. I think he helps with the maintenance and winding of the Town Clock. They have both been key members of the Pittsfield Old Home Day Committee for many years.

Pittsfield holds many memories for me. I grew up in Barnstead, but my Dad and many of his brothers worked in Pittsfield. I attended Pittsfield High School and grew up in so many ways as a result of the staff there. I went on to college with skills I needed to succeed.

I spent hours playing at the grain store, Merrimack Farmers, and enjoyed being part of the activity there. I worked at Green's Drug Store where my Uncle Alfred was the pharmacist and local humorist. My Uncle Fred worked at the Tannery and my Uncle Felix worked at the liquor store. My mother worked at the shoe shop and my Aunt Odná worked at the drugstore. Most of my cousins also went to Pittsfield High. I remember ice cream at Green's, haircuts at Buster's, church, the Scenic Theatre, Hemeon's, Barney's, the Five and Dime, and on and on. It was a great place to transition into adulthood.

Each time I read the *Post* or drive through Pittsfield I am grateful for all the town provided for me and my family, and for my friends. *Richard A. Jenisch*

Dear Crabby:

It used to be that when I went to the doctor I got to read old magazines while I waited. But these days the waiting room provides nothing. It's as if Covid wiped out our ability to read. Instead, I'm required to fill out long questionnaire forms. How should I deal with this new nuisance? *SICK of IT*

Dear Sick of It:

You are not alone. When I go to a medical clinic I get the same request. Here's how I deal with the questions: I start by writing across the top of the form that I am a paid consultant and my time filling in the rest of the form will be billed at \$150/hr or part thereof. My siblings are easy – two brothers still alive in witness protection somewhere, and a sister who after three gender identification crises, declared herself a mermaid and was last seen swimming through the Buttermilk Channel off Manhattan, on the Governor's

Island side. My parents were so conventionally boring that they were dead for three years before anyone noticed. I list them as a statistical dead end. My grandparents are quite murky, so I avoid hard facts. I describe one grandfather as executed by the Foreign Legion for desertion, and mention another who died at age 93 after some sort of refusal to participate in a shotgun marriage. A grandmother who died at age 7 while going over Niagara Falls in a barrel, I describe as having died in confinement. This is how I deal with medical clinic questions, and I recommend you try it too. 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Cook's Corner

Cowboy Pasta Salad – Dinner Worthy!

Here's a fun twist on the proverbial pasta salad. This one is so hearty, it's truly dinner worthy. I like to serve this as a main dish on a hot summer evening and when I do, it's served warm or at room temperature. If serving for dinner, put out some sour cream, your favorite salsa, and some pickled jalapenos for topping. Cornbread muffins are a fun side too. One of my daughters likes to add shredded lettuce to this dish. You might try that as well. Enjoy! *MP Christakos*

Kosher or coarse salt

16 oz farfalle pasta (bow tie shaped)

1&1/2 lbs ground beef (or a mix of ground beef and sausage)

2 tsp taco seasoning mix

Fresh ground black pepper

1/3 cup olive oil

3 TBSP lime juice

½ to 1 tsp ground cumin

1 (15 oz) can black beans, drained & rinsed

1 (15 oz) can corn, drained

2 cups cherry tomatoes, halved

2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese

4 scallions, thinly sliced

In a large pot of boiling and salted water, cook pasta according to package directions until al dente. Drain and transfer to a large bowl.

Meanwhile, season beef with taco seasoning, salt & pepper. In a large skillet over medium-high heat, cook beef until no longer pink. Drain excess fat.

In a small bowl or liquid measuring cup, whisk oil, lime juice and cumin; season with salt & pepper. Pour over the pasta and toss to combine.

Add beef, beans, corn and tomatoes to pasta and toss well to combine. Fold in cheese and scallions.



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Homemade Ant Spray

This is a public service announcement. With all the rain we've had, I don't know about you, but we have an ongoing ant problem at our house. Those tiny little pesky ants keep coming around. Here's a homemade ant spray that is definitely pet friendly and definitely works. I use this to spray the door jamb of our sliding glass door as well as the area behind my kitchen faucet (where I typically find the ants). I usually spray at night, once people and pets are in for the evening. Try it out, hopefully it will work well for you, too. *MP Christakos*

2 cups vinegar (cider or white, either is fine)

2 TBSP liquid dish soap, such as Dawn

2 TBSP baking soda

Water

1 large spray bottle

Combine vinegar, dish soap and baking soda in a large bowl and stir well to combine. Transfer the mixture to a large spray bottle, fill the rest of the bottle with water. Spray affected areas.


Taylor Davis, Loudon

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
Lyman Park
