I Pagliacci July 13-14 at the Scenic Theatre



Cook's Corner Tortellini – Two Ways!

Summer weather has arrived and I'm sure we're all looking for fun, refreshing and hearty salad options. Here are two ideas that I hope you'll

enjoy. Pasta Salad Skewers is a lovely appetizer for your summer parties. Tortellini Caesar Dinner Salad is a terrific quick & easy go-to for a hot, busy weeknight meal. Wishing you and yours a wonderful July 4th holiday. Bon appetit! *MP Christakos*

Pasta Salad Skewers

1 (9 oz) package fresh or frozen tortellini

¼ cup white balsamic vinegar

1 pint grape / cherry tomatoes

1 (8 oz) package fresh mini mozzarella balls (aka "pearls")

½ lb salami, sliced or cubed

1 to 2 cucumbers cut into ½ inch chunks

1 (6 oz) can / jar whole, pitted black olives

1 cup fresh basil leaves

Optional ideas: artichoke hearts cut into chunks, pepperoncini peppers

15 to 20 (10 inch) skewers

Sauces for serving: Ranch dressing, pesto sauce, vinaigrette

Cook the tortellini according to package directions, drain well and rinse with cold water. Transfer to a bowl, toss with the balsamic vinegar and season with salt & pepper, stir to combine.

Alternating the remaining ingredients, thread the tortellini, mozzarella balls, salami, cucumber, olives, basil leaves, artichokes and pepperoncini. Create different combinations on each skewer. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

Serve with your favorite sauce or dressing.

Tortellini Caesar Dinner Salad

1 (9 oz) package refrigerated or dried tortellini

4 cups chopped romaine lettuce

2 cups chopped or shredded rotisserie chicken

¼ cup shredded or shaved Parmesan cheese

½ cup Caesar salad dressing, your choice

1 cup salad croutons

Ground black pepper

Lemon wedges for serving


Cook the tortellini according to package directions, drain.

Select Board Review June 25, 2024

Another public hearing last night, this time for input regarding a gift totaling over \$50,000, the bulk of which is for paving of the parking lot and shared driveway which serves the Carpenter Library on Main St. The remainder pays for a radio in the FD command car. Following the hearing (during which there was no public comment or questions) the board voted to accept the gift, with thanks to the generous donor.

The warrant was approved for Civil Forfeitures for unlicensed dogs. The number of unlicensed dogs is down this year, but still an issue. Dog owners are advised that licensing (and importantly the required rabies vaccination) is NH state law, and will be enforced.

One property tax abatement was approved, as were two Land Use Change Tax assessments.

Jim Allard, board rep. to the Community Development Committee, reported that they have a new member, Marc Smith, who has a business background and offered a number of valuable suggestions at their last meeting. More members of the business community would be a big asset to the CDC.

The wastewater treatment plant report continues to show a profound need to have the sludge removed from the lagoons, as the readings exceed Federal limits and the chemicals required to treat the discharge are very expensive. However, removal of the sludge will exceed \$1.2 million so the town continues to pursue any grants that might be of assistance. Right now we're between a rock and a hard place.

Cara updated us on the status of several requests the town has made to the NH DOT; a stop sign westbound on Main St at the corner of Carroll St, reduced speed limit on Barnstead Rd. (Rt 107), and repairs to the Clark's Pond dam. Seems we are on a long list which they assure us will be dealt with, but on their own schedule, which doesn't seem to line up with ours. We'll keep at them.

Noel came in to ask if it was ok to contact the state regarding engineering for a potential sidewalk rebuild by the highway dept. on Main St. from Broadway down to Clark St. in 2025. It's in severe disrepair but due to the failure of the proposed 2024 budget back in March, there is no money to do the job now. We are hopeful the budget will pass next year. If that happens we need to have state approval already in place, as we're constantly reminded how long it takes to acquire it. *Carl Anderson*

The House's last session was on June 13, and it worked on the bills that were moved to the floor from the Committee of Conference (a committee of Senate and House members) assigned to work out the final details of a particular bill. On the floor, there are only three possibilities: a yes vote brings it to the Governor for his approval, a no vote kills the bill, and a table vote kills the bill. Fifty-one bills made it to the floor. Most of these bills were passed by a voice vote with no debate. Listed below are the bills that met a discussion and a division vote (yay to nay count).

SB340, relative to communication between parents and school districts regarding special education, special education reporting requirements, and the office of the special education advocate, passed 188-179.

HB1018, which concerns on-premise and off-premise liquor licenses and land in current use still being allowed for a discount, passed 190-176. This bill combined two bills to pass much-needed liquor law corrections.

HB1091, relative to campaign finance, was debated since it would require the name and address to be taken for every campaign donation. Currently, there is no requirement for \$50 or less. This is unworkable for a citizen led legislature as we have in New Hampshire. This needs correcting in the next session. The bill passed 190-181.

HB1215, relative to development approval and appeals, contained a special section allowing the town of Hampton to discontinue a highway to lease that property to a new casino development. Since this is generally done at a town meeting, there was much discussion on whether the town could legally allow a 99-year lease. This bill failed 102-261 on a non-partisan vote. Most legislators were not comfortable mandating what clearly falls under local control.

HB1265, which concerns failing to file school expenditure reports concerning adequacy grants and requires school districts to report expenses, passed 183-172.

HB1369, relative to verifying voter rolls every four years instead of the current 10 years, failed 178-185.

HB1370, relative to eliminating voter identification exceptions by requiring a hotline to verify voter identity, was tabled 223-141.

HB1386, relative to prohibiting the disposal of lithium-ion batteries in solid waste landfills, composting facilities, or incinerators, passed 238-118.

HB1400, relative to residential parking spaces, landlord-tenant law, unauthorized occupant evictions, and zoning procedures concerning residential housing to help reduce the housing shortage, passed 205-149.

HB1616, relative to parental consent and notification for student participation in Medicaid to schools program, failed 173-179.

HB1633, relative to the legalization and regulation of cannabis, was tabled 178-173. An attempt to remove this bill from the table shortly after also failed by even more votes. The Senate and House were divided on this bill in three ways: one-third was no to weed, one-third was yes but only regulated by the state and one-third was yes but with free reign to the public.

HB1665, relative to student eligibility for the education freedom account program increasing to 425% of federal poverty guidelines, failed 168-185.
